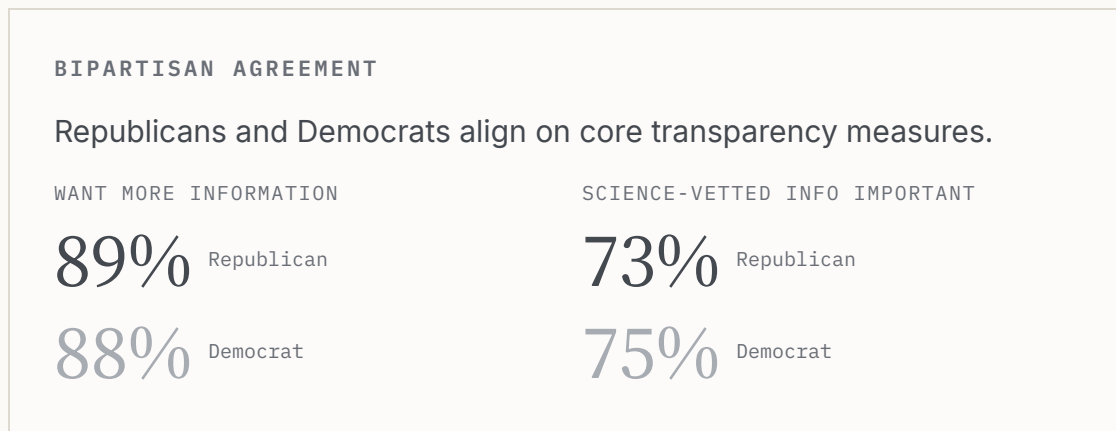
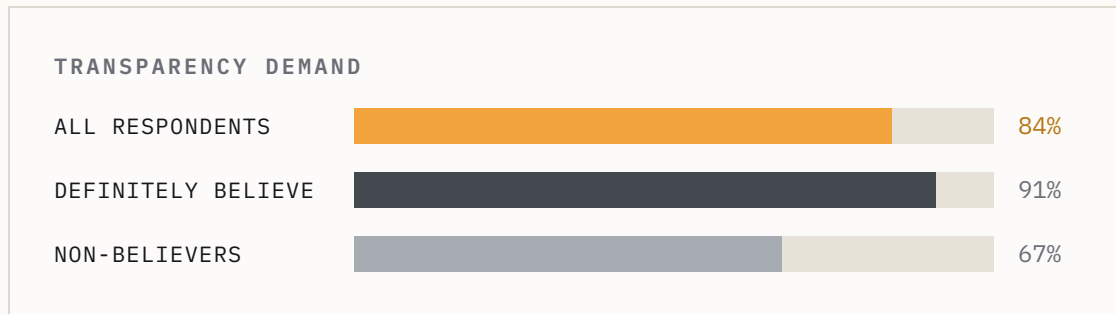
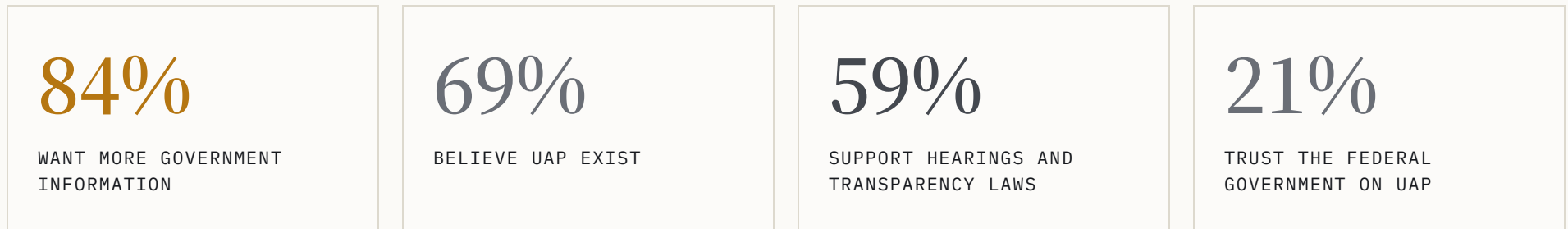

Public Sentiment on UAP Transparency

A national survey of 303 U.S. adults shows broad demand for public disclosure, low trust in federal information channels, and strong support for science-led inquiry.

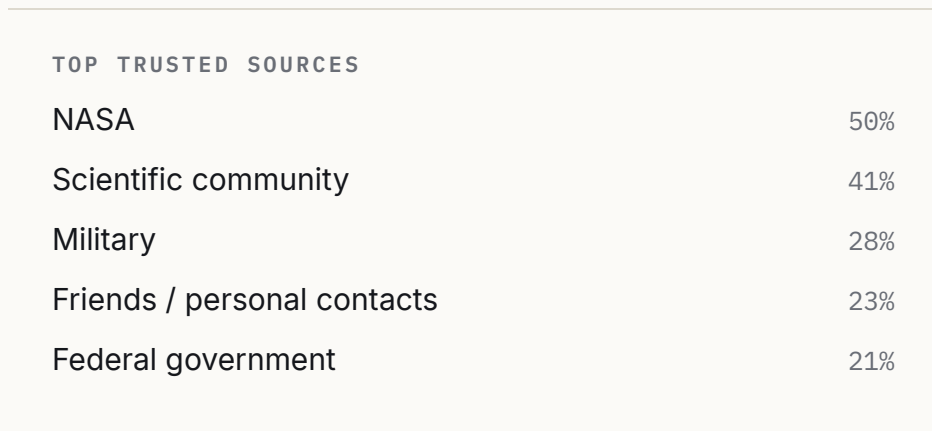


The public mandate is transparency, not belief.

Belief in UAP is widespread, but the more important finding is broader: even respondents who do not believe UAP exist still want more government information released.

Trust is concentrated outside the federal government. NASA and the scientific community are the leading sources respondents trust for UAP information.

The issue also has civic activation potential: definite believers are far more likely to follow the issue, notice government releases, and support nonprofit scientific work.
